



ongratulations to all Wood River Manufacturing Complex employees. On Oct. 27, 1992, you reached yet two more safety milestones—6 million safe work hours and two years without a lost work day. This "bestever" safety record at Wood River began Nov. 16, 1990.

In a recent memo, Gayle Johnson told employees that the Complex is a "safety pacesetter" in the industry, not only among Shell locations, but throughout the U.S. and the world.

"We earned this prestigious position by focusing on a common goal and by applying the very basic principle of doing each job correctly, with concern for ourselves and those around us," he wrote. "Individually and collectively, we exert a lot of effort evaluating the way we run our facility, with an eye on maximizing per-

formance while minimizing health and safety risks. Safety training, prevention awareness and recognition programs are ongoing, making a positive difference as our record indicates."

Employees also were recognized by Ron J. Banducci, General Manager, Manufacturing-Oil. In a wire received at the Complex Oct. 28, 1992, Banducci wrote: "Congratulations to all Wood River Manufacturing Complex employees for your new alltime WRMC safety record of 6 million safe hours. You gained this new record through dedication, commitment and

hard work. In true quality fashion, you are demonstrating continuous improvement since reaching 1 million safe hours for the first time as a Complex on March 10, 1991.

"Success in all endeavors results only from working as a team made up of individuals, each focused on a common goal," he continued. "You have demonstrated your skills, competence and desire to be the best as you focus on prevention. And no group of WRMC employees has ever done it better."

Gayle Johnson asked employees to continue to keep safety at the forefront of everything they do at work and at home. "Let's not be satisfied with our current record," he wrote. "Rather, let's set our sights even higher and focus on improving on our 1991 performance. We can do it...I know we can!"

# WRMC Forms Partnership With Madison High School

ome 220 students who attend Madison High School are getting some extracurricular education this year, thanks to the new Partners In Education relationship forged this fall with Wood River Manufacturing Complex employees.

Modeled after the partnership WRMC has had with Roxana High School for the past three years, Madison High School students will be gaining workplace experience in careers many of them plan to select upon graduation. And like the Roxana High School partnership, Madison High School and WRMC have formed a committee that meets monthly to devise ways to enhance the education of students.

"We had our first contact with Madison High School last year when we did the 'Choices' program at the school," explains Tara Condon-Tullier, Community Relations Analyst. "Madison Principal Robert Mehelic was impressed with the program and asked if we could partner with his school. A few months later, the merge was made."


Just like the partnership with

Roxana High School, Madison's P.I.E. committee must first decide how money will be spent and evaluate if Wood River has any equipment to donate. The committee also will consider which learning events, such as Shadow Day, would be beneficial to students.

"We see what we can help them with and, in turn, they learn about us and what we can offer them," says Howard Olsen, Manager Hydroprocessing. "We start slowly because it takes time for both sides to agree as to what action to take."

#### WRMC Sponsors IEPA Internship Program

Complex formed an innovative partnership with the State of Illinois this summer, by sponsoring three students to the Governor's Environmental Corps, an internship that exposes students to issues and careers in the environmental field. The pilot program was developed by Governor Jim Edgar and the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency.

Thirty-two high school and college students from throughout Illinois participated in the privately funded program, which ended Aug. 7. Most of the students worked at the IEPA's Springfield office and several were based at IEPA regional offices. During the program, students were assigned to work in a specific area of the IEPA, such as water pollution control, legal counsel and pollution prevention.

As part of the internship, the Shell-sponsored students visited the Complex for a refinery overview, tour and introduction to safety and environmental programs. The students returned to WRMC for further discussions on the environmental program and one-to-one meetings with Shell engineers.

Shell was one of 10 companies to fund the Governor's Environmental Corps.

#### Reminder To Join The Employee Health Team Fitness Program

n February, the Employee Health Team introduced the WRMC Fitness Program to help employees and their families maintain good health. The ongoing program includes a binder with modules on heart rate, body fat, stretching, walking, and a beginner's guide to weight training. "This was a terrific opportunity for employees to learn more about local agencies while raising the awareness of volunteer opportunities in their community," explains Tara


> Condon-Tullier, Community Relations Analyst. "It just makes sense to become more aware of our local notfor-profit agencies."

#### A Moment In History

onday, Oct. 5, was kick-off day for conversion of the former Research Diagnostic Lab building to the permanent location of Wood River Manufacturing Complex's History Museum.

About 20 retired volunteers and current employees gathered at 8 a.m., to begin cleaning up inside and outside facilities. Following a safety briefing by Complex Safety personnel, crafts workers commenced dismantling and stripping out obsolete equipment and piping. Other volunteers raked and

mowed and generally cleaned the outside grounds, and kept inside floors swept free of debris for the crafts workers.

The group designated Mondays and Wednesdays, from 8:30 a.m. to 2 p.m., as regular work days. To date, about 15 to 20 people are helping with the project. "We're very pleased with the response, and we enjoy working together," says History Museum curator Andy Dick. "We also appreciate the support we have received from current Shell employees."


