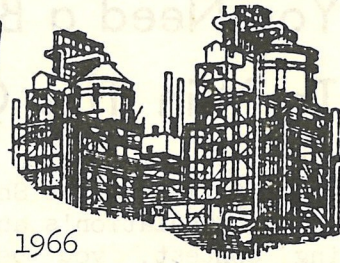

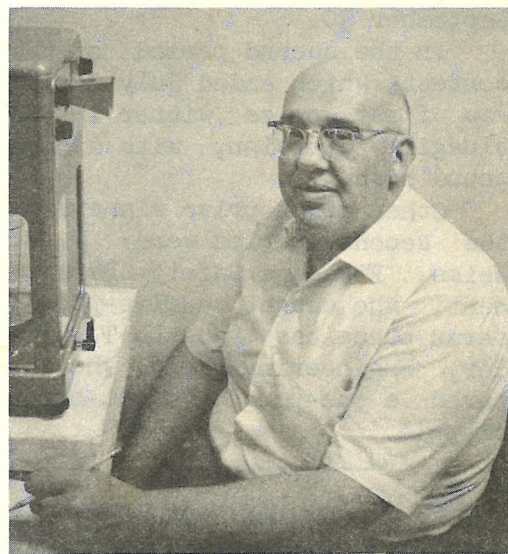

If you expect to catch the biggest fish in the Shell Recreation Association's annual fishing contest, you better catch one bigger than seven - pounds, nine - ounces.

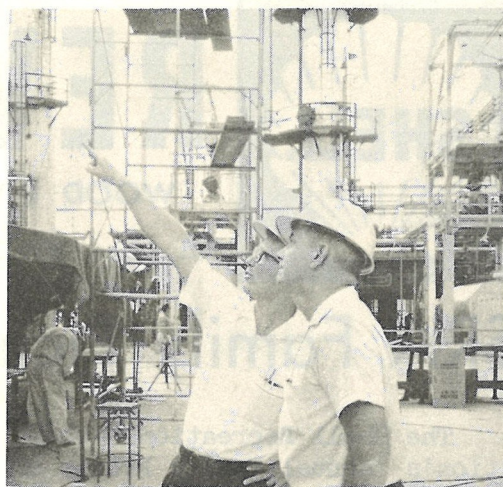

70 Employees in SRA Plant Bowling League

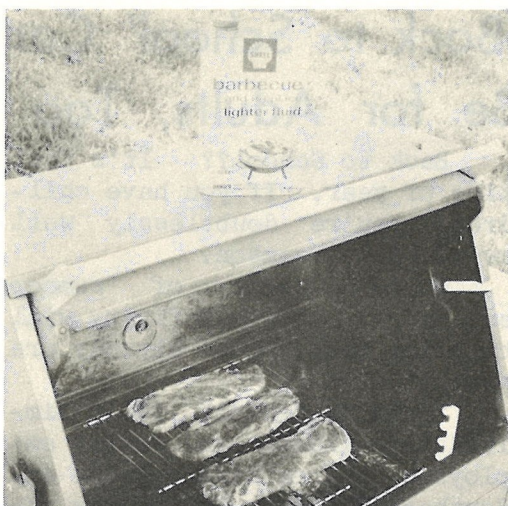
More than 70 Refinery employees are members of bowling teams in the Shell Recreation Association's eight-team league. Pin action began August 24, at the Wood River Bowl.

R. L. GRAY, retired, died on August 16. Gray retired March 1, 1963, from the Lube Oils Department.

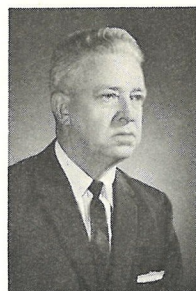
A. W. CRONAN, Engineering Field employee who retired March 1, 1963, died on August 17.

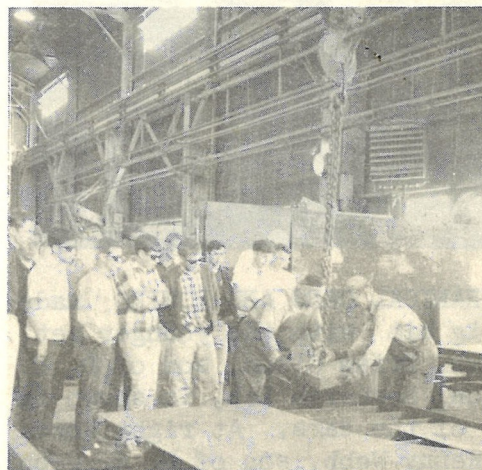

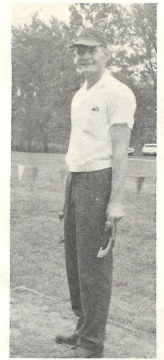

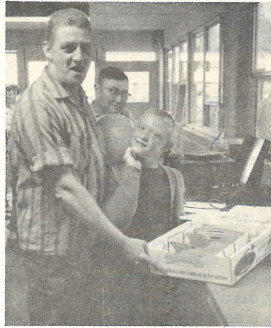

Equities Fund unit values on August 4 and 19, respectively, were \$1.655 and \$1.592.

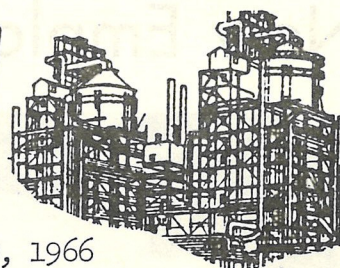
The average cost per share of Shell stock purchased during August was \$60.09.

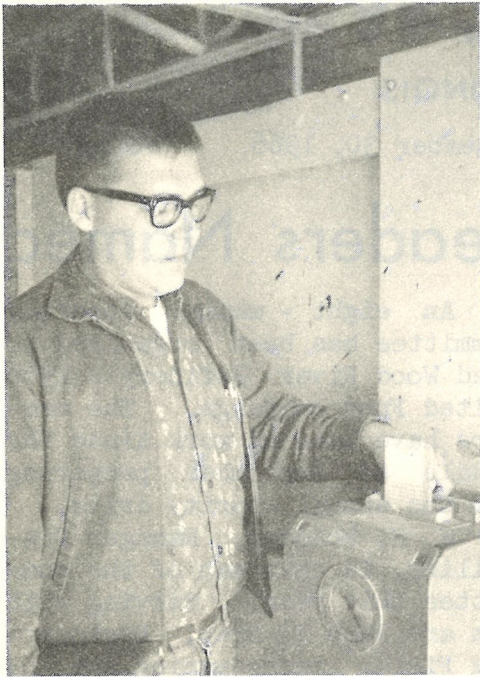
The committee has chosen as the theme for this year's drive, "Hope is in your hands." You've probably heard it on radio or television in the past few days.

Other work by the committee has included visits to several of the charitable agencies which are supported by contributions to the United Fund.

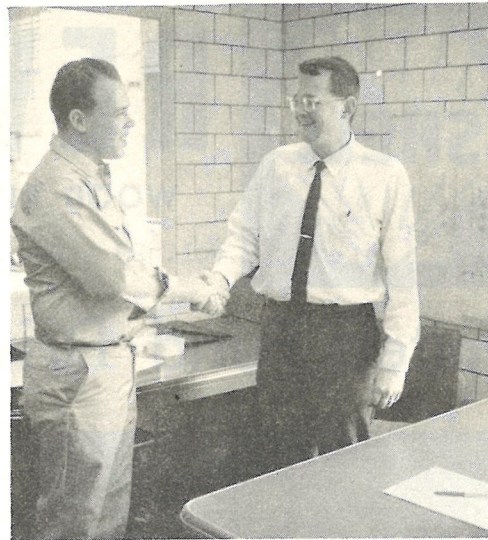
These visits were intended to bring drive leaders in closer contact with the agencies and those who benefit directly from United Fund donations.

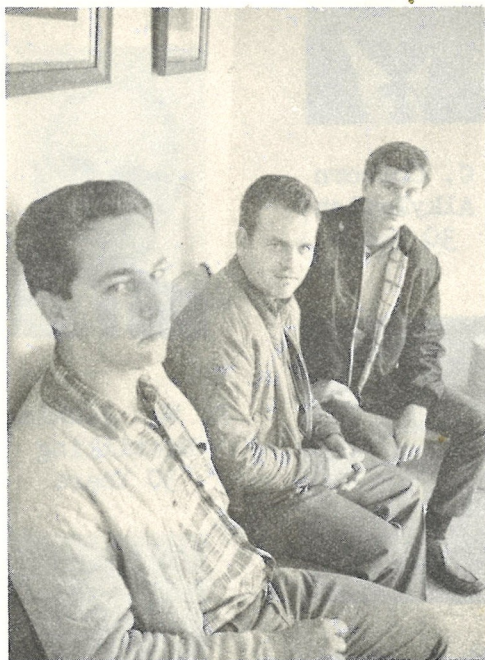
There's Still Time!

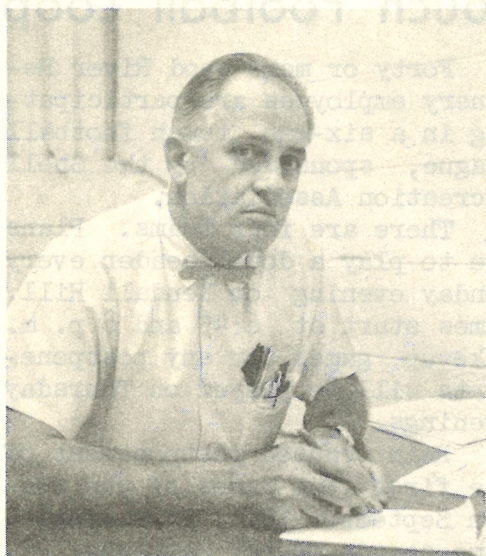
Another make-up contest remains to be played by Technological and Engineering Office.

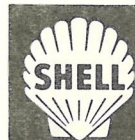

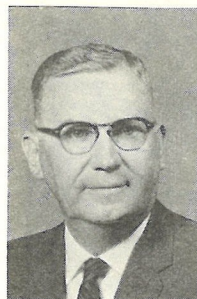

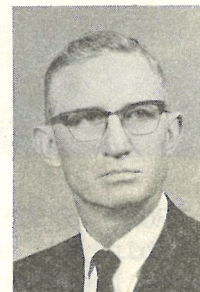
